Card Callmaker

- The Card Callmaker uses a punched card to call the number for you.
- It is easy to operate.
- Telephone and Telex models.
- Helps to reduce misdialling.
- Cards may be filed in any order or with customers' records for regular calling.
- Convenient second attempt calling when called number engaged.



Description

The callmaker is housed in a light grey plastic case, which also contains a power unit.

A card well, which will hold up to 30 cards, a card slot, a red pilot lamp and a 'cancel' button are contained in the top of the unit.

Protruding from the base beneath the card slot is a smoke grey plastic tray into which the cards drop on completion of dialling or after cancelling a call.


The white plastic card on which a telephone number is stored has feed-holes down each side and spaces for writing the name of the person to be called and the digits of the number.

There is a row of five pre-scored holes opposite the space where each digit is written.

A guide and punch are provided to push out the centres of the pre-scored holes to give the appropriate pattern for each digit of the number.

A pattern of holes is punched into each row, depending upon the digit required.

The card, shown here actual size, has been punched for the number 437 0929.





How it operates

The red pilot lamp on the callmaker indicates when it is switched on.

When the handset is lifted and dial tone is heard, the card is dropped into the slot at the front of the callmaker.

The card works its way through the slot, step by step, dialling the number automatically, then drops into the tray below.

A call can be cancelled while the card is making its way through the slot by replacing the handset and pressing the 'cancel' button. The card then drops through to the tray below.

If engaged tone is heard, a second attempt to call can be made, by clearing the line and re-inserting the card.

Numbers are changed by punching a fresh card.

Facilities

Each card can record up to 16 digits so that any number that can be dialled direct in the United Kingdom and most of those dialled abroad, can be stored on the cards.

Index dividers are provided to help keep the cards in order, and speed location of numbers.

The callmaker can be used with most types of telephone from which calls can be dialled. The telephone can be used normally as required.

When used on Private Automatic Switchboards. The callmaker can be used on an extension from a PABX. When the number is being punched on the card an extra hole is introduced opposite the access digit. On making a call, this causes a short pause after the access digit to allow time for connexion to the exchange line.

When used on PABX6 extensions, however, exchange access dialling tone must first be obtained by pressing a button on the telephone before the card is dropped into the slot at the front of the callmaker.

General information

The callmaker is connected by means of two flexible cords, one to the telephone connexion point, and the other to a 3-pin socket of at least 3-amp rating provided by the subscriber.

Each callmaker is provided initially with a plastic box containing 50 cards, a set of 9 index dividers, a guide and special punch.

Additional cards can be purchased in boxes of 50, each of which includes a set of index dividers. Packs of 1,000 cards without index dividers are also available.

Additional guide and punch sets are available for a small charge.
